Of the 50 FAAs targeted for monitoring, 8 terminated their participation with ICA program while 1 FAA merged with another agency. However, a new FAA in Italy was accredited. Some Receiving Countries have 2-3 years of post-placement supervision prior to the finalization of adoption. The adoption decrees reported are those received in 1st and 2nd quarter of children placed in previous years or in the 1st quarter of CY 2019.			Not all children cleared during the quarter were matched within 10 days after receipt of the ICA clearance. Incomplete documents and insufficient/inconsistent information in the children's dossiers (notwithstanding the issuance of the CDCLAA) delays matching. Completion of documents is necessary to ensure the matching to suitable Prospective Adoptive Parents. Most of the children cleared were older children and members of sibling group thus requiring Special Home Finding as there are no available approved adoptive parents in the Roster of Approved Applicants. However, due to uncontrollable factors such as PAPs inability to handle the demands of the behavior of a child or the child's high expectation of the adoption placement, the placement does not lead to finalization of the adoption. ICAB collaborative work with FAA and CA to find suitable replacement family and afforded the appy to minimize the trauma of disruption.
