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# HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

## REORGANIZATION OF INTER-COUNTRY ADOPTION BOARD (ICAB) TO NATIONAL AUTHORITY FOR CHILD CARE (NACC)

Republic Act (RA) No. 11642, also known as the Domestic Administrative Adoption and Alternative Child Care Act, was signed and approved on **January 6, 2022**, and became effective on **January 28, 2022**. RA 11642 is an act strengthening alternative child care by providing for an administrative process of domestic adoption and alternative child care, reorganizing for the purpose of the Inter-country Adoption Board (ICAB) into the National Authority for Child Care (NACC), amending the purpose Republic Act No. 8043, Republic Act No. 11222, and Republic Act No. 10165, repealing Republic Act No. 8552, and Republic Act No. 9523, and Appropriating Funds, therefore.

The law provides for and allows simpler and inexpensive domestic administrative adoption proceedings and shall streamline services for alternative child care. The NACC shall exercise all powers and functions relating to alternative child care including declaring a child legally available for adoption and intercountry adoption, foster care, kinship care, family-like care, or residential care. All duties, functions, and responsibilities of the Inter-Country Adoption Board (ICAB), the DSWD, and those other government agencies relating to adoption and alternative child care are transferred to the NACC.

A Transition Team was created as mandated by Section 56 of Republic Act 11642 composed of the DSWD and ICAB to act as NACC during the three-year transition period. The Transition Team has developed transitory guidelines to implement Section 56 of the law which will allow all judicial petitions for domestic adoption pending in court to avail the benefits of the Act. The Transition team simultaneously collaborated with various government and non-government agencies in the establishment of the NACC including the drafting of implementing rules and regulations of the law.

The Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of Republic Act No. 11642, was drafted and finalized in collaboration with the University of the Philippine Law Center (UPLC), the Department of Social Welfare and Development-Program Management Bureau (DSWD-PMB), and the technical working group composed of government and non-government agencies. The IRR went through a series of Public Consultations concluded by a Ceremonial Signing graced by esteemed Senator Grace Poe and participated by different government and non-government organizations. The IRR was signed on **July 28, 2022**.

## ENACTMENT OF REPUBLIC ACT NO. 11767



### IRR of R.A. 11767 *Ceremonial Signing* September 9, 2022



Republic Act (RA) 11767, otherwise known as the "Foundling Recognition and Protection Act" was signed into law on May 6, 2022. It is an Act promoting the rights of and providing greater protections to deserted or abandoned children with unknown parents, amending for this Purpose Articles No. 276 and 277 of the Revised Penal Code and Special Laws, recognizing their status as natural-born citizens of the Philippines, providing penalties against acts inimical to their welfare, and for other purposes.

The Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of RA 11767 was approved through a Ceremonial Signing on September 9, 2022, which was attended by the authors of the law and stakeholders. A series of public consultations and technical working group meetings were also conducted prior the event.

### APPROVAL OF RENEWAL OF AUTHORIZATION/ RE-ACCREDITATION FOR TEN (10) FOREIGN-ADOPTION AGENCIES:

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the re-accreditation visits were suspended. The Board resolved to issue re-authorization/ re-accreditation for Foreign Adoption Agencies (FAAs) with a positive desk, and desk review assessment. 4. NORFIL Foundation Inc.



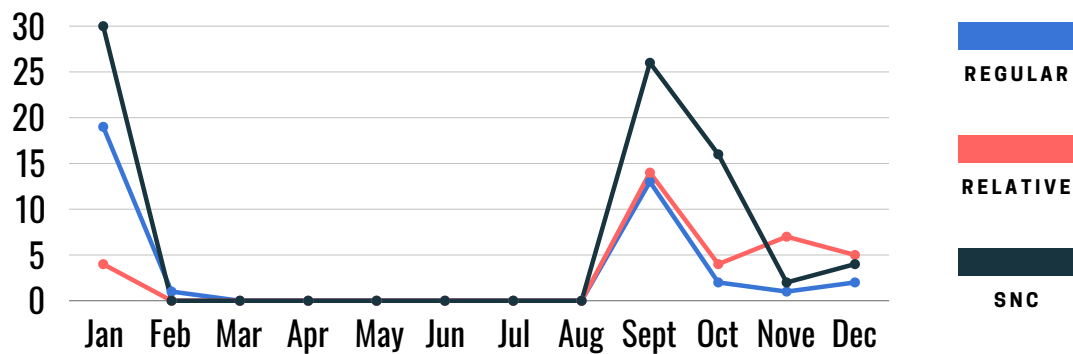

For CY 2022, a total of 80 children were accepted by the Prospective Adoptive Parents (PAPs), and One-hundred thirty-two (132) children were entrusted with their PAPs. Out of the 132 children, fifty-three (53) were Special Needs Children while seventeen (17) were independent placement. Based on the graph, the trend for all the types of adoption fluctuates throughout the first semester. For regular adoption, the highest peak was in 1st quarter and the lowest drop was in last quarter.

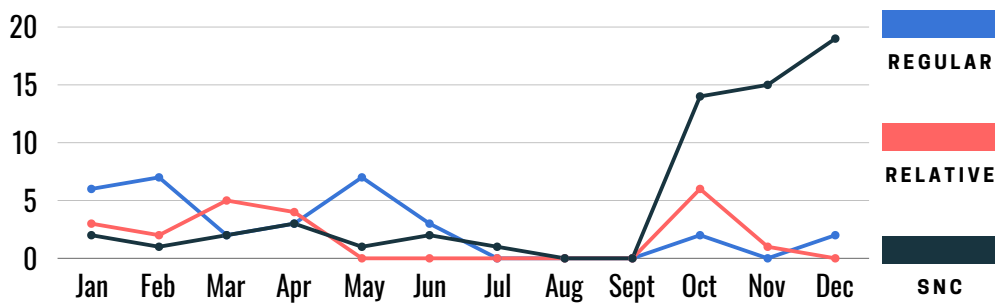

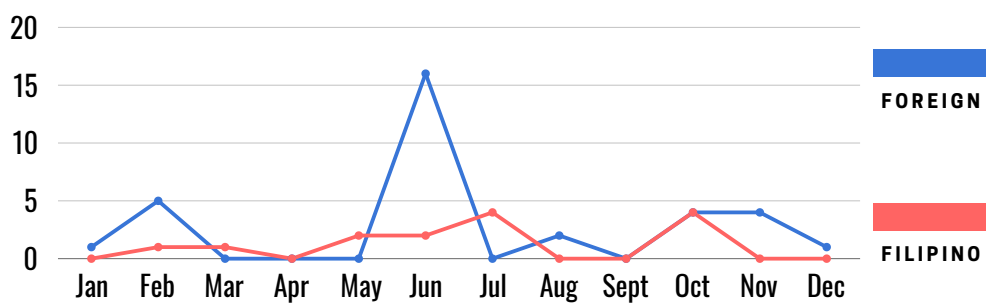

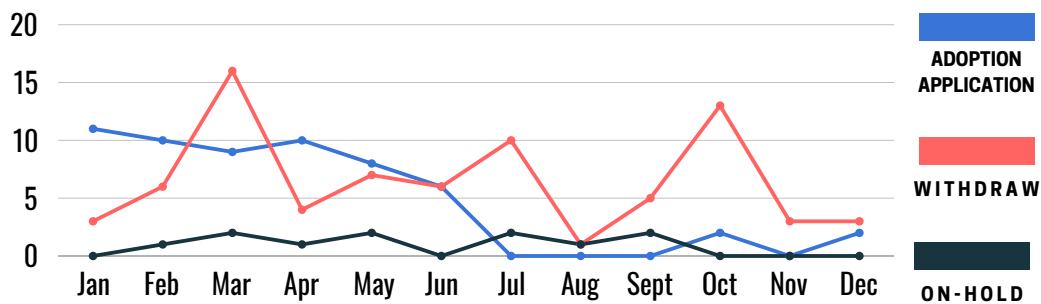
A total of eighty (80) new adoption applications were received and assessed. Out of these 80 applications, thirty-eight (38) or 47.50% were from the USA, twenty-three (23) or 28.75% were applicants from Europe, fifteen (15) or 18.75% were from Canada, and four (4) or 3.5% was from Asia Pacific. The 48 adoption applications were approved by the Board.

NACC currently has three hundred twenty-seven (327) approved prospective adoptive parents (PAPs) awaiting child referral. Out of these 327, fifty-two (52) are PAPs with Filipino heritage, while two hundred seventy-four (274) PAPs are foreigners.

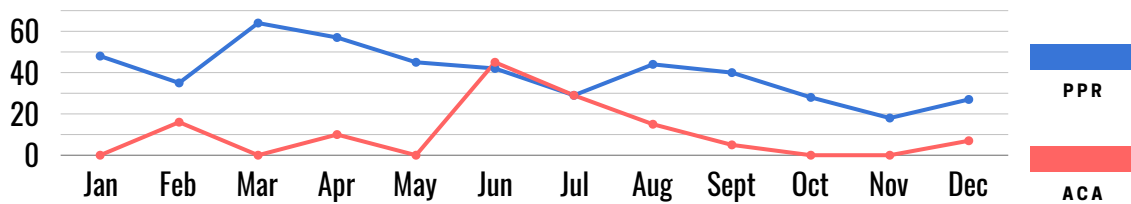

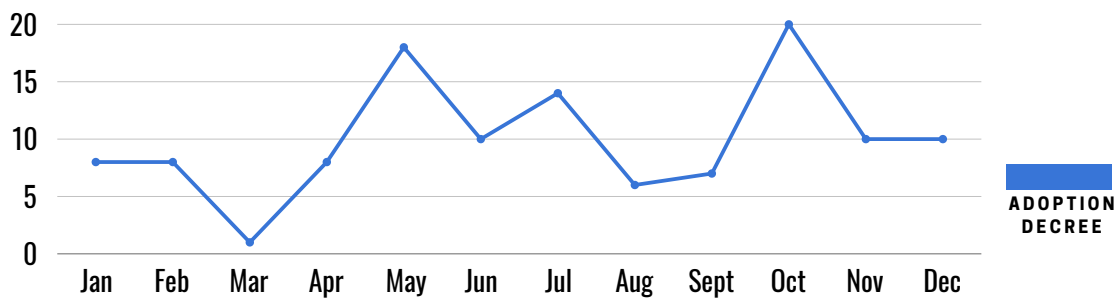

The Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) Alternate Chair issues the Affidavit to Consent to Adoption (ACA) for the placement of the child is finalized. The three (3) to four post-placement reports submitted every two (2) months during the six (6) to eight (8) months for special home-finding cases are the bases for the issuance of the ACA. A total of four hundred sixty-seven (467) children are under post-placement supervision during the period in review. One hundred twenty-seven (127) ACAs were endorsed to the CAS/FAAs during the period. The required supervisory trial custody period was satisfied and legalization/finalization of the adoption of the child/ren was approved.

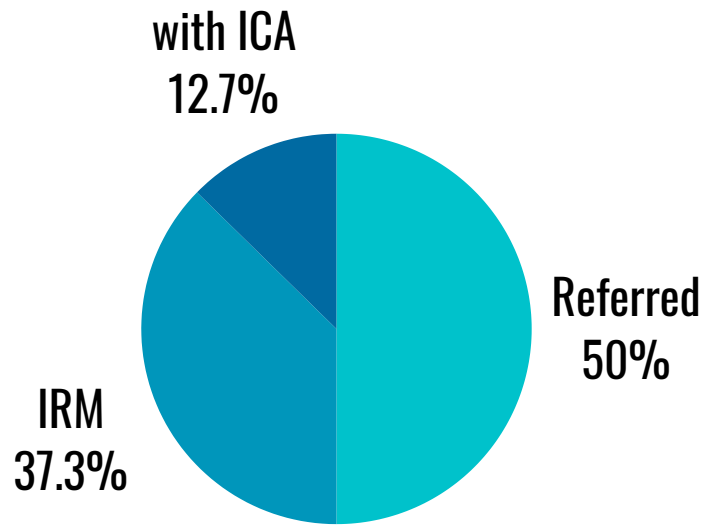

One Hundred Twenty (120) Adoption Decrees were received during the period in review. The Adoption Decrees received during the year were for the children whose placement occurred since 2017.

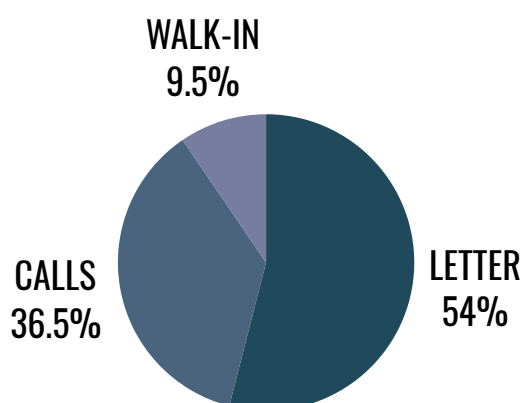


With the passage of RA 11642, Section 56 specifically provides for the transitory clause to ensure non-disruption of programs and services. As soon as the Memorandum Circular No. 13 was approved. The inter-regional matching was transferred from the DSWD to NACC. There are one-fifty (150) cases of children received by NACC for inter-regional matching (IRM).

Of the total of one hundred twelve (**112**) cases of children presented to the Inter-Regional Matching, eighty-one (81) children were matched with Prospective Adoptive Parents (PAPs), and six (6) children are awaiting additional information from the Child Caring Agency/Residential Care Facility, twenty (20) children are awaiting for the issuance of ICA clearance.

A total of thirty-eight (**38**) Relative cases for issuance of ICA clearance, out of 38, thirteen (13) children were reviewed and/or awaiting additional information

### INQUIRIES RECEIVED



A total of six hundred three (603) inquiries were responded to and clarified the peculiarities of the Philippine ICA Law, particularly on relative adoption; its process, procedures, and requirements. Due to the pandemic, inquiries received were mostly correspondence sent via email or regular mail.

In May 2022, a five-day orientation on Section 56 of Republic Act 11642 or “Domestic Administrative Adoption and Alternative Child Care Act) was conducted which was participated by NACC officers, selected DSWD-Program Management Bureau, and social workers from different Regional Alternative Child Care Offices (RACCOs). The activity highlighted the discussion on salient features of the new law and various ways in which they can have effective collaboration in ensuring that the process of domestic and intercountry adoption and foster care are made “simple, expeditious and inexpensive and shall redound to the best interest of the children.

## Capacity Building Training for Technical Writing Cum Case Study Writing for Social Workers



The training program was conducted in four (4) clusters, and the training is successful in attaining its objective to enhance the overall quality competencies of the participants through the various modalities utilized by the resource speakers and training team. The Capacity Building Training Program was approved by Professional Regulatory Commission (PRC), thus granting 15.75 Continuing Professional Development (CPD) units to the social workers that have completed the learning and development requirements.

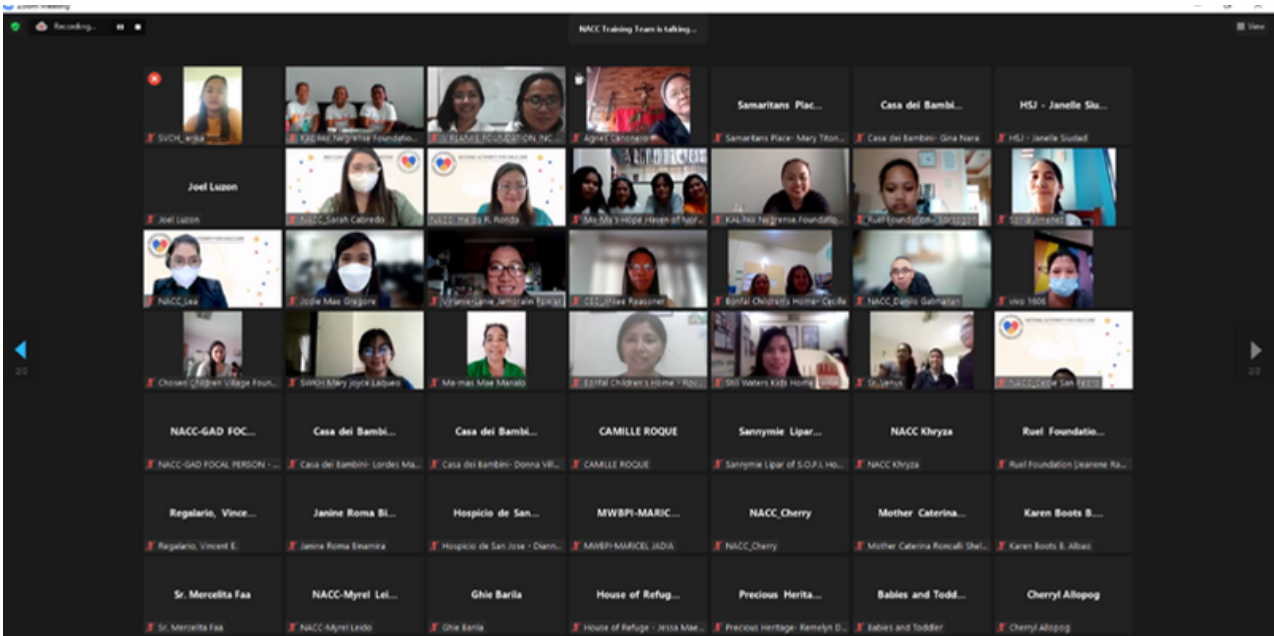
## Alternative Child Care Week Celebration 2022

### TRANSPARENCY SEAL

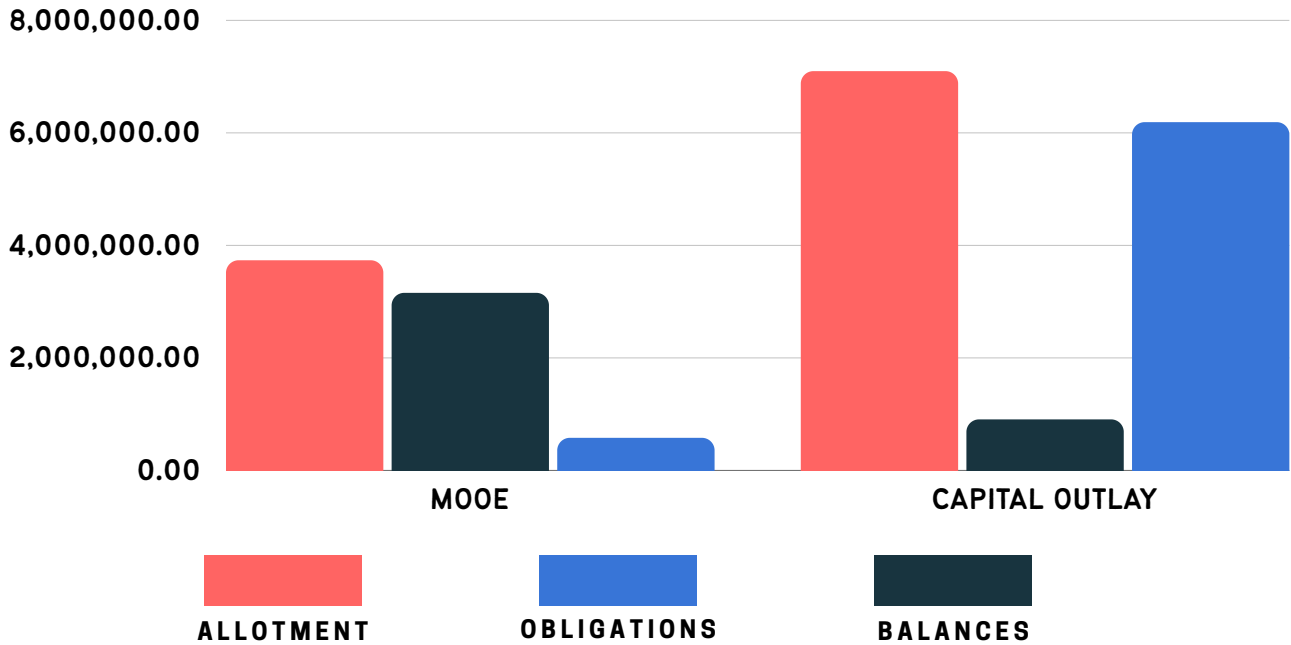

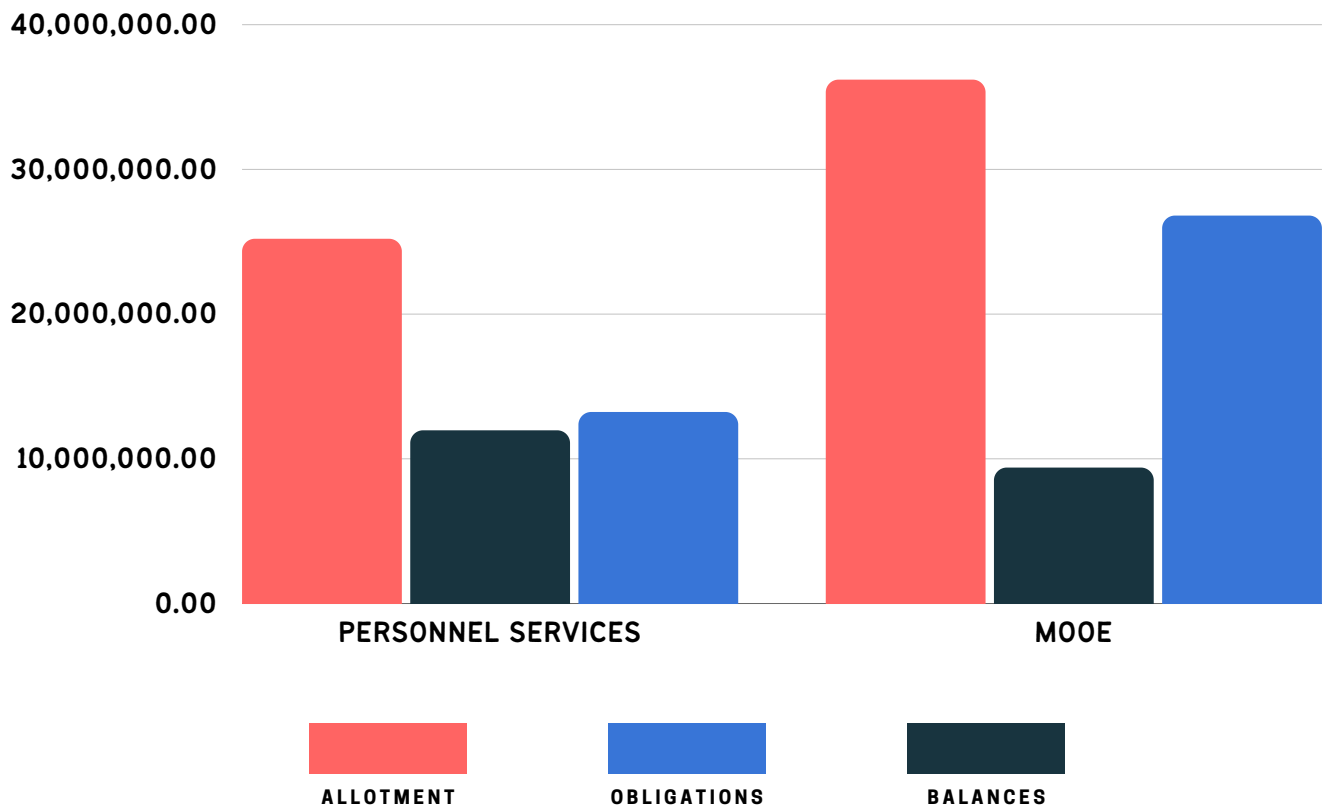

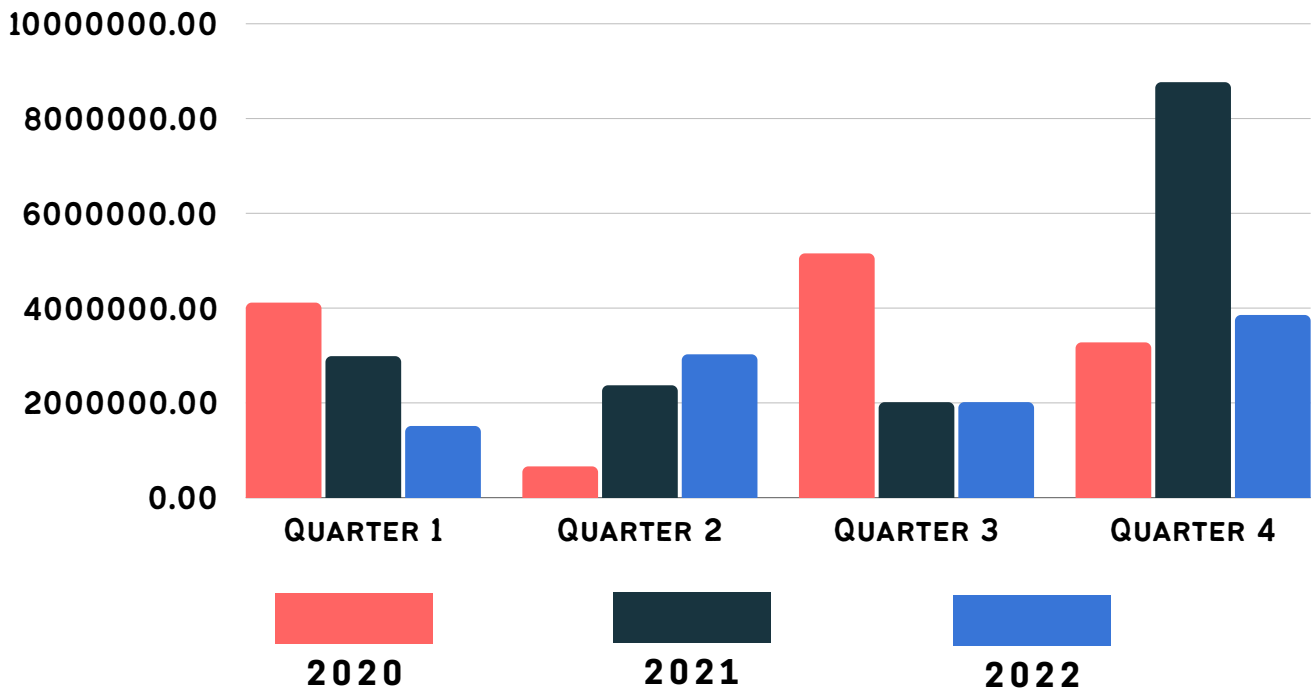

# STRENGTHS & CHALLENGES

## STRENGTHS

- The passage of RA 11642 will streamline the processes and make it less expensive
- The Conduct of video conferences with the social workers of child-caring agencies allows for an open discussion of the suggestions and requests for information. it also hastens the submission of the updated requirements on child-placed adaption.
- Matching conferences were held via zoom which allows the ICPC and social workers of the child-caring agencies to participate in the matching despite the COVID-19 situation.
- Continuous review of children's dossier and conduct of the matching conference despite the COVID-19 situation which is attributed to the availability of digitized documents of the prospective adoptive parents and children.
- The Children's travel documents are delivered to the PAP's hotels to avoid face-to-face interactions with social workers.
- 

- Interruption of the internet connection during matching conferences, meetings, and conferences.
- Due to ECQ and its travel restrictions in March-April 2021 some scheduled passport applications, visa medical, and interviews were postponed. in effect, the processing of children's travel documents will take more time to complete.
- The NACC physical targets are accomplished, however, the budget utilization remains under target due to the global pandemic the intended expenses for travel and training have been canceled and/or delayed.

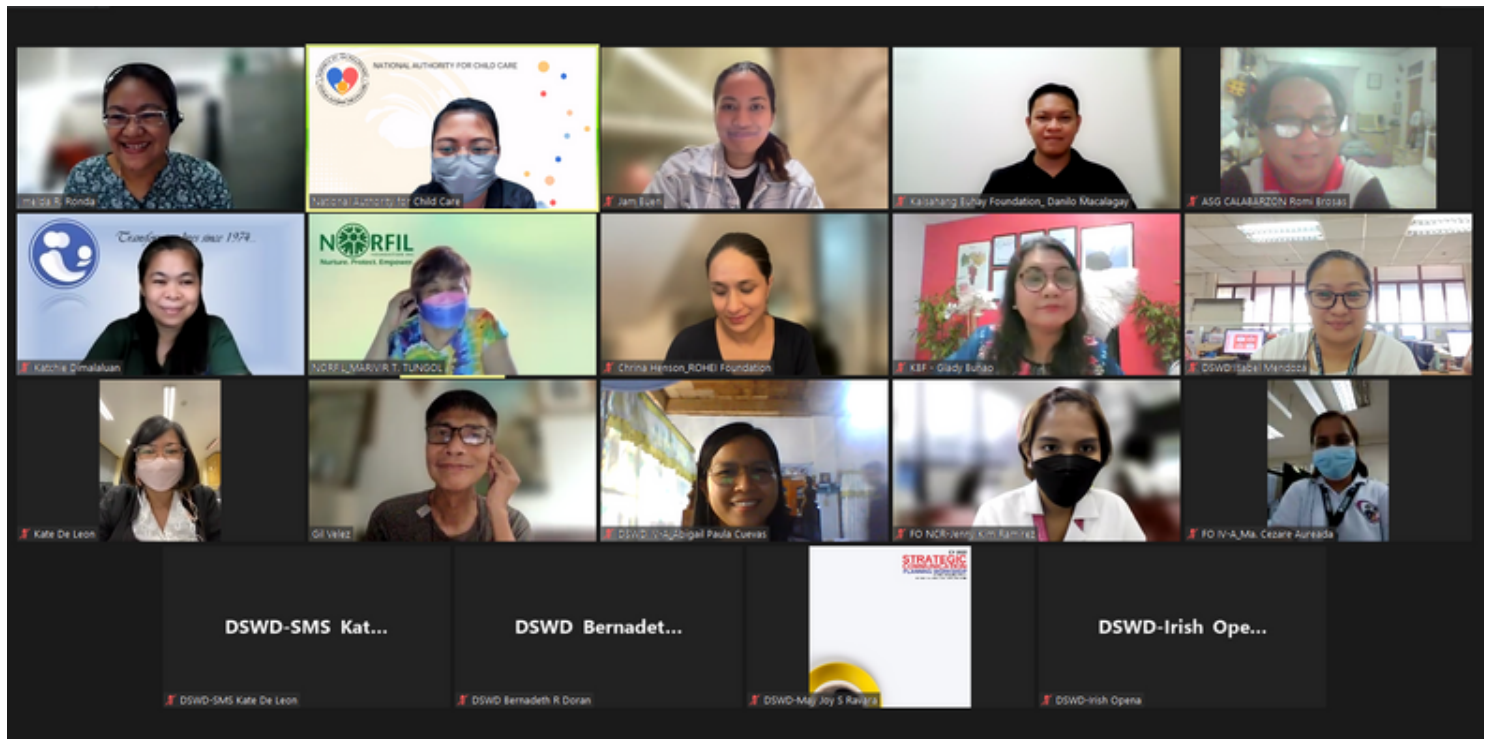
